



Boarding Information

Keep in mind, your dog will experience the same activities as daycare while boarding. The only difference is that your dog will spend the night.

What to Bring

- Please bring your dog's food, and any medications they are on, or might be on (anxiety medication, storm/firework medication), as well as pill pockets to administer medications with (or peanut butter, cheese, lunch meat, etc). **Please be prepared to give the names of the medications to reception as well as their purpose.**
- You can also bring your dog's favorite toys, blankets, treats and bedding.
- Do **NOT** bring their bowls- we provide bowls and also have slow feeders on hand.
- If your dog doesn't eat or won't eat due to anxiety, please bring something that we can entice your dog with to encourage them to eat.

Keep in Mind

- Please remember that this isn't "Home." Your dog may not do certain behaviors at home, such as chew their bedding or destroy a blanket, but they might here. If this is your dog's first time boarding, they may act a little out of character due to anxiety from being in an unfamiliar place.
- This is also the same for their appetite. If your dog always eats while at home, there is a chance they might not eat here, again, due to anxiety.
- At check-in, you're asked to fill out an **Item Checklist**. We ask that you fill it out completely with **detailed descriptions** of each item. This ensures that everything you brought for your pet, goes home with you at departure.
- We recommend you stop by for a tour before you make your reservation so you can see our facility and the different sizes of suites we have available.
- We do **NOT** allow visitors to come and see your dog while they are here. This causes unnecessary stress on your dog because seeing familiar faces to them gives them the impression that they are going home, when they're not. Dogs are then prone to diarrhea, not eating, destructive behavior, etc, again due to the added stress. We want to keep all pets as comfortable as possible. You are more than welcome to call us for an update on how your dog is doing, as well as check social media for photos of your pet. (Please note photos are not guaranteed!)
- If you have more than one dog, depending on their sizes and weights, you may be required to book two separate suites.



What to Expect from Doggie Daycare (for you to keep)

Doggie Daycare can be fun and a wonderful experience for your pup! Here are a few things to keep in mind when sending your dog to play.

Benefits of Daycare

- **Socialization**-Puppies need to learn young how to behave in groups of dogs and to trust new people. Socialization is good for older dogs as well. It can help them stay young and playful for years to come!
- **Confidence**-Daycare can help even the most reserved dogs with his/her confidence. Being with other dogs, they learn behaviors and social cues that us humans can't teach them. It may take some time, but you will see your dog grow into a whole new pooch!
- **Anxiety**-Instead of staying home alone, worrying and possibly eating your furniture, daycare provides them with an escape from their anxiety!
- **Exercise**-Your dog will burn off TONS of energy in daycare! They spend their day running around in the play yards and playing fetch! We also offer plenty of shade from the sun and water to quench their thirst!

What to expect AFTER Daycare

- **Increased Appetite/Thirst**-With extra activity, it is normal for dogs to be more hungry and thirsty. We have water available at all times inside and out; however, when they are busy having fun, they don't always stop to drink as much as they should.
- **Boo-Boos**-Dogs play with their teeth and claws. The more active of a player your dog is, the more likely they are to come home with scratches or marks. Our play groups are always supervised by multiple staff and we do our best to keep the dogs safe and scratch free, but sometimes it happens. If we notice any marks or scratches on your dog, we will notify you.
- **Cooties**-Daycare for dogs is really no different than daycare for children. Every child catches a cold at some point. Unfortunately, dogs can not tell us when they do not feel well. We may not know they are "sick" until they show physical signs such as sneezing, coughing or diarrhea. We do everything in our power to prevent illnesses in our facility, but nothing is fool proof. If we notice anything at all, we will let you know. If you notice your dog is not feeling well, please notify us and keep them home to prevent spreading any illness.
